Why Social Media in Teaching

- Student empowerment and Classroom democratization
 - Students fully integrated in mind, body, and spirit with teaching and learning process
 - Develop ethical reasoning and judgment in complex contexts
 - Develop leadership and management skills in complex contexts
 - Develop ownership in the learning process
- Faculty courage development
 - Provide space to allow the teacher to show passion and engage that passion with students
 - Ensure buy-in to course objectives
 - Ensure buy-in to course content delivery methods
